

Understanding Financial Aid, Grade 11: Educator Guide

Objective: Students will complete the lesson titled Understanding Financial Aid in order to determine whether FAFSA or CADAA is the appropriate financial aid application for them.

Connection to College & Career Readiness Anchor Standards

- The following prompt is connected to the College and Career Readiness Anchor Standards; it is recommended that you assign this prompt to students as a reflection or exit ticket: What questions do you still have about the logistics of completing a financial aid application? Who will you talk to in order to determine which financial aid application is right for you?

Educator Script/Introduction:

"I have good news for you: financial aid is available to you! In California, financial aid resources are available to every student regardless of citizenship status. During your senior year you will complete one financial aid application: Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) or California Dream Act Application (CADAA). Selecting the right application will be important; part of today's lesson is to help you think about which application will be the right fit for you and your family. Both the FAFSA and the CADAA require parent/guardian information for completion by dependent students; this person is called a "contributor." Most students need someone to help them complete their application. Today you will go to CaliforniaColleges.edu to learn more about financial aid applications."

Pretest (5 minutes)

- Instruct students to complete the pretest, which asks the following questions:
 1. Which of the following applications do you need to complete to qualify for financial aid for college?
 2. In which year of high school do you complete a financial aid application?
 3. When is the typical priority deadline for the Cal Grant?
 4. What is the role of a contributor on a financial aid application?
 5. Who can help you complete your financial aid application?

How and When to Apply for Financial Aid (15 minutes)

- Play the following tutorial for students or provide the link to students so they may watch it independently: [How to Use the Financial Aid Lessons for 11th Grade Students](#).
- Direct students to sign in to **CaliforniaColleges.edu** and navigate to the **Financial Aid Lessons** in order to complete **Understanding Financial Aid: How and When to Apply for Financial Aid**.
- Instruct students to read through each slide in the lesson.
 - Instructional tip: Consider pairing or grouping students so they may take turns reading each slide out loud.
- Remind students to click “Complete Slides” on the last slide of each lesson.
- Instruct students to complete **questions 1, 2, and 3** of the posttest. Discuss correct posttest answers as a class:
 1. Which of the following applications do you need to complete to qualify for financial aid for college?
ANSWER: Either FAFSA or CADAA
 2. In which year of high school do you complete a financial aid application?
ANSWER: Grade 12 (senior year)
 3. When is the typical priority deadline for the Cal Grant?
ANSWER: March 2

What It’s Like to Apply for Financial Aid (15 minutes)

- Direct students to return to the **Financial Aid Lessons** on **CaliforniaColleges.edu** in order to complete **Understanding Financial Aid: What It’s Like to Apply for Financial Aid**.
- Instruct students to read through each slide in the lesson.
 - Instructional tip: Consider pairing or grouping students so they may take turns reading each slide out loud.
- Remind students to select “complete slides” on the last slide of each lesson.
- Instruct students to complete **questions 4 and 5** of the posttest. Discuss correct posttest answers as a class:
 4. What is the role of a contributor on a financial aid application?
ANSWER: Anyone asked to provide information on the financial aid application form.
 5. Who can help you complete your financial aid application?
ANSWER: All of the above.

Reflection/Exit Ticket (5 minutes)

- Direct students to respond to this prompt: What questions do you still have about the logistics of completing a financial aid application? Who will you talk to in order to determine which financial aid application is right for you?

Extension of Learning

- Instruct students to talk to their parents/guardians to determine whether they qualify for FAFSA or CADAA. Remember, these are the determining characteristics:
 - Select the **FAFSA** if one of these describes you:
 - You're a U.S. citizen and so are your parents/contributors.
 - You're a U.S. citizen with undocumented parents/contributors who have decided to share their information with the federal government.
 - You're a permanent resident.
 - You're an eligible non-citizen.
 - You have a T Visa.
 - Select the **CADAA** if one of these describes you:
 - You're undocumented.
 - You're a U.S. citizen with undocumented parents/contributors who have decided NOT to share their information with the federal government.
 - You'll be eligible to receive state aid, but not federal aid.
 - You have a valid or expired DACA.
 - You have a U Visa.
 - You have Temporary Protected Status (TPS).
